- Medical claims and insurance premiums.
- Funding for the Redevelopment Authority.

Mr. Stonehill asked about the projected end-of-year cash balance. Mr. McCutcheon mentioned the transfer of money for the renovations at the baseball stadium.

Ms. Kelley commented about real estate tax appeals.

Mr. Stonehill noted concern about the parking arrangement.

Mr. McCutcheon reviewed the following information:

- Neighborhood Services Fund revenue & expenses year-todate.
- The City lien revenue.

Ms. Carter asked about the outstanding balance from receivables. McCutcheon said the balance is in the \$9 to \$10 million range and mostly unchanged.

Mr. McCutcheon noted there will be some balances paid through application of the American Rescue Plan Act funding.

Mr. Stonehill noted that the City has not budgeted to collect any of the unreceived balances. Mr. McCutcheon noted that the payments from the American Rescue Plan Act funding is partially budgeted. Ms. Carter asked what would happen if there were not enough customers that are covered by the payments. Mr.
