Call to Order	Ms. Carter called the meeting to order at 4:01 p.m.

	economic development remain a priority to the

	assist the City of Harrisburg as the Authority moves

	Ms. Carter noted that the Authority has not met any		
	stakeholder who is not willing to jump in and help.

Ms. Carter provided an update on the status of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement. She noted that the City delivered a draft of an agreement on January 14, 2020. This was in response to a draft that the Authority had delivered to the City on August 26, 2019. Ms. Carter indicated that the Authority will communicate a response to the City by Friday, January 31, 2020. The hope is to receive a reply from the City by Friday, February 14, 2020.

Ms. Carter indicated that she hoped to then schedule a joint session including attorneys and leadership to create a final document. This schedule would put final ratification on track for the February 26, 2020, meeting of the Authority.

### Presentation by Ms. Shelia Dow-Ford from Impact Harrisburg

Ms. Carter introduced Shelia Dow-Ford, Executive Director of Impact Harrisburg. She noted that Authority Member Douglas Hill serves as the Vice-Chair of the Board of Impact Harrisburg. City Solicitor Neil Grover serves as the Chair.

Ms. Carter noted that the Impact Harrisburg Mission Statement mirrors the priorities of the Authority: "We provide grants for City economic development and infrastructure projects that bolster Harrisburg's tax base, provide jobs for City residents and positively improve the operational efficiency of the City."

Ms. Dow-Ford joined the Authority on the dais and distributed a presentation to the Authority.

Ms. Dow-Ford noted the Authority has stated priorities: "Sound financial management and reporting, community and economic development, and operational excellence." She noted that they dovetail very neatly with the mission, vision, and goals of Impact Harrisburg.

Ms. Dow-Ford reviewed the names and positions of the Impact Harrisburg Board of Directors.

Ms. Dow-Ford noted that Impact Harrisburg was established under the Harrisburg Strong Plan to help develop economic development opportunities. The original available resources provided was approximately \$12.3 million through the parking transaction as a part of the Act 47 plan.

Ms. Dow-Ford reviewed some of the projects associated with the \$9.9 million disbursed to about 14 projects of which almost 10 projects are complete.

	All projects fall into two categories: infrastructure and economic development.	
	Ms. Dow-Ford noted that Impact Harrisburg utilized two consultants, Mr. Larry Segal, a former DCED employee, and Milligan and Company from Philadelphia.	
	Ms. Tina Nixon asked about a specific project and about entrepreneurial education programs.	
	Mr. Ralph Vartan asked about funding and working with Harrisburg's priorities. He asked if the ICA could work in support of programs and partnerships.	
	Ms. Kathy MacNett asked about the remaining funds and Impact Harrisburg's next steps.	
Comments from	Mr. Weber announced that the City of Harrisburg has

Comments from	Mayor Papenfuse stated that, on behalf of the City, he	
Mayor Eric	wished to respectfully, but strongly, object to the	
Papenfuse	Board's interpretation that certain Board members should be excluded from Executive Sessions. The City believes this is contrary to the Act, which established the ICA. He added that it is clear to the City that exofficio board members are entitled to the same rights and responsibilities as any other board member. It is the intent of the act that ex-officio board members participate because, especially at this juncture, it would be valuable to the Authority, as we are working on the Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement. A framework that excludes them is wrong and sets up an oppositional framework rather than a collaborative framework. The decision to exclude ex-officio board members has been a repeated decision and the Mayor wanted to lodge that objection publicly.  Ms. Carter thanked the Mayor for his comments.

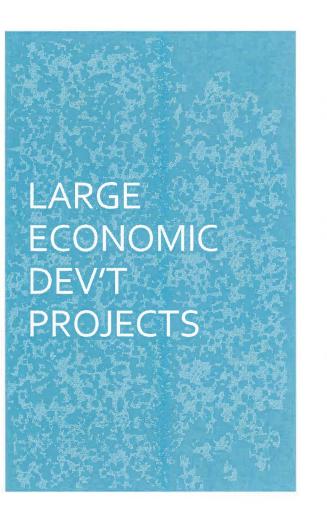
- Purpose: help redevelop larger problem or blighted properties in neighborhood or business districts in City; jump start activities on larger projects.

- Comprehensive Strategies recommended



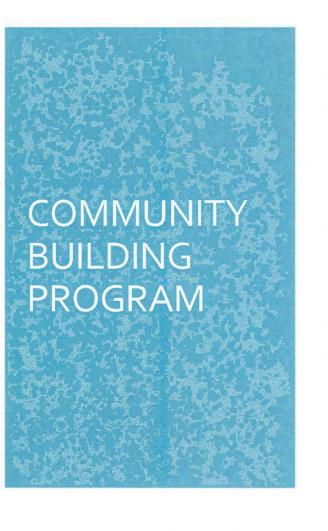
- Eligible Uses:
- Acquisition, redevelopment of blighted sites
- Demolition (blight removal)
- Construction
- Site Development
- On-site and site to main infrastructure improvements
- Environmental remediation



- GRANT LIMIT:
- Maximum grant: \$500,000. Minimum grant: \$50,000.
- M ATCH REQUIREMENT:
- A. \$50,000 to \$250,000 minimum 1:1
- B. \$250,000 to \$500,000 minimum of 1:3 (Impact: Project)

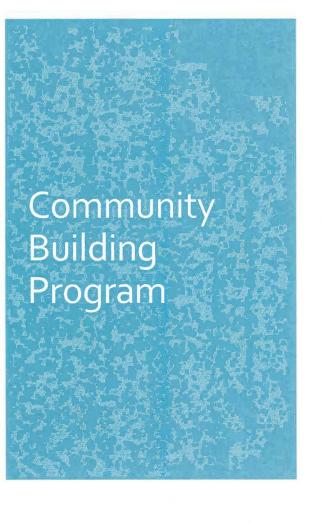


- Eligible Applicants:
- Private sector individuals or businesses;
- 501 (c)(3) not for profits;
- not for profit economic development corporations;
- City of Harrisburg;
- Harrisburg Redevelopment Authority;
- Harrisburg Land Bank;
- Similar authorities and agencies serving the City.

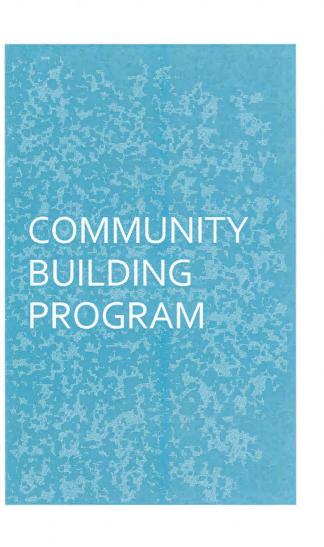


 Purpose: Accelerate, expand activities already underway in neighborhoods by offering grants to facilitate funding to property owners for façade improvement over a period of time.

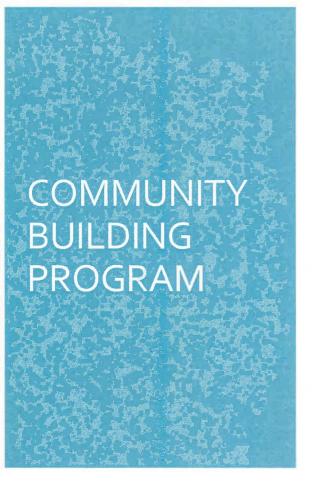
 Goals: To improve the livability, visual appeal, safety and neighbor –to- neighbor interactions that rebuild relationships and ultimately ownership in City neighborhoods, contributing to a better, more livable, city.



- Eligible Uses:
- Multi-year strategies (up to 5 yrs.) in geographically self-defined areas developed by a responsible party that is either a (c) (3), City of Harrisburg, or private sector developer.
- Façade improvement for residential and commercial properties in target areas addressing blight and creating ownership in community.
- Strategies similar to state DCED Main Street and Elm Street Programs. Applicants responsible for implementing activities with individual property owners.
- IH grant may be used to provide grants or low interest loans to property owners.



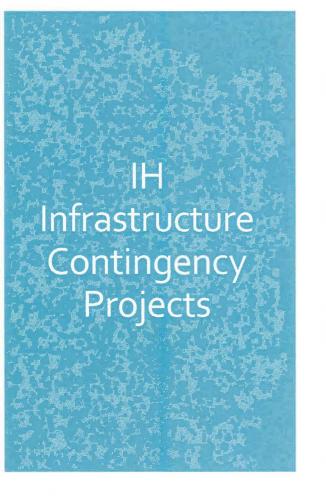
- GRANT LIMIT:
- Maximum grant amount is \$350,000.
- MATCH REQUIREMENT: 1:1
- Source of match is broadly defined, but must be demonstrated
- Interior improvements are eligible match
- Funds may be matched with weatherization, aging services, utility and similar sources



- ELIGIBLE APPLICANTS:
- Not-for-profit 501 ( c ) (3)
- Not-for-profit economic development corporations serving the City
- City of Harrisburg
- Harrisburg Redevelopment Authority
- Harrisburg Land Bank
- Private corporations with demonstrated community support



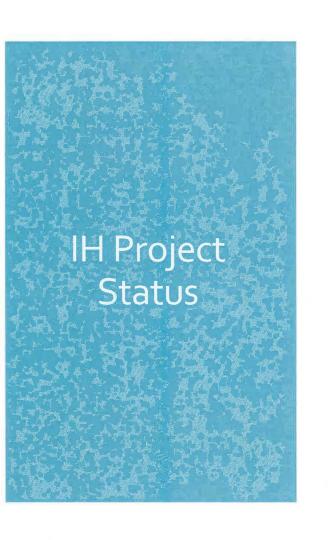
- Eligible Uses: Sewer, water lines; treatment facilities; transportation (roads, bridges, sidewalks, signals); Internet broadband; Wi-Fi Service; Mass transit; City lighting; private property sewer/water problems and similar projects
- \*Two Awards: Multi-modal Collaborative Project (City of Hbg., Capital Region Water)
- Total Shared Award: \$5,487,290.50
- \$2,743,645.25 per awardee



- Eligible Uses: infrastructure-related emergency needs causing stress on the City's General Fund for which no other grant source is readily available
- Grant Limit: \$500,000
- No match requirement
- Eligible Applicants: City; CRW
- \*\$250,000 City Microsoft 365 award



- Eligible Uses: non-infrastructure-related emergency needs causing stress on City's General Fund for which no other grant source is readily available
- Used to address unexpected problems that impact health and safety of city residents that are not a normal operational expense of city government
- Grant Limit:\$250,000 Match Requirement: 1:1
- Applicants: City; Dauphin County; Land Bank; Redevelopment Authority serving City



- Began making awards in late 2016
- Projects began in 2017
- As of December 2019: 10 projects fully complete
- 3 projects close to completion
- Multi-modal Phase II in progress
- Board discussing second funding round
